

I'm often reminded, because our pastor has never asked us, "What is our religion,?" his question is simple, "What is your faith?"

# Hands Off! A Day of Protest in Defense of Democracy

On Saturday, April 5, 2025, people across the country took to the streets to send a clear message: *Hands off our democracy*. In over 1,400 towns and cities, citizens came together under one banner to protest the increasingly authoritarian actions of the Trump-Musk administration—a regime whose policies many believe pose a direct threat to American civil liberties and democratic norms.

I was proud to stand among them.

In Hastings-on-Hudson, a usually quiet village along the Hudson River, I joined a spirited group of protesters, including a close friend, to raise our voices in unity. The air was cold, and the rain relentless, but the energy was undeniable. People came prepared—not just with signs and umbrellas, but with stories, resolve, and a shared sense of urgency. Despite the cold rain, the turnout was strong, and the energy was electric. The gathering took place at the **Veterans of Foreign Wars Building**, a powerful and deeply symbolic setting. Standing on the grounds of an institution dedicated to those who served to defend freedom abroad, we came together to defend it at home.

We gathered under umbrellas and huddled close to hear speeches from our fellow neighbors. Concerns were raised across a wide spectrum of critical issues. Speakers passionately addressed the administration's threats to Social Security, health care, public education, scientific integrity, and the erosion of civil rights.

Each story, each voice, carried a sense of urgency, frustration, and fierce hope. The common thread through every speech was a deep belief that the future of American democracy depends on active participation and solidarity. What struck me most was the unity. Though many of us had never met before, there was an unspoken bond—one forged by shared concern and an unyielding belief in justice and a desire to protect what we hold dear. We weren't just protesting policies. We were defending the very idea of democracy: a government by the people, for the people. Each voice painted a vivid picture of how the administration's decisions are affecting real people in real time.

The Hands Off! movement is more than just a moment of protest; it's a call to vigilance. It's a reminder that civic participation doesn't end at the ballot box. It lives in the streets, in conversations, in our willingness to show up—even in the rain.

That Saturday may have been wet and gray, but it was also full of color—of courage, of passion, and of hope.

Our national social/criminal justice attorney Benjamin Crump, Esq. moderated both panel discussion. The social justice panel was entitled, "From Grief to Action." Reverend Al Sharpton had a fireside chat with Ari Melber [MSNBC] and Al B Sure!
